Ol. Chair's Report

My role as Chair of the European Australian Business Council (EABC) continues to be a great honour and privilege. The past year has been one of momentum and renewal for the Council, as we strengthened our engagement with both Australian and European partners and advanced our mission to deepen business, trade, investment, and innovation ties between our regions.

I extend my sincere thanks to **Deputy Chair Vicki Thomson**, whose leadership and contribution to the work of the Council continue to be invaluable as we expanded our policy work and enhanced our advocacy across priority pillars of the relationship. This has included a focus on deepening knowledge trade routes and R&D collaboration and investment as critical drivers of productivity, security, and socioeconomic prosperity.

In October, we were delighted to welcome **Hon Brendan O'Connor** as a **Deputy Chair**, joining myself and Vicki in leadership of the Council's Board. Brendan brings exceptional experience and a deep understanding of the Australian policy landscape from his distinguished parliamentary and ministerial career, which spanned more than two decades. He served seventeen years on the frontbench, including in the Rudd, Gillard, and Albanese Governments, holding senior portfolios including Employment and Workplace Relations; Skills and Training; Home Affairs; Immigration and Citizenship; Defence; Industry; Science; and Small Business.

Brendan's record of achievements in government is significant and enduring, particularly in supporting small business; enacting reforms to build the skills Australia needs now and into the future; and laying the foundations for a new industrial policy - the Future Made in Australia agenda.

I would also like to take this opportunity to welcome **Jade Dixon**, Sydney Managing Partner of PwC Australia, who will take up the role of **Treasurer** of the Council. Jade brings deep financial and professional expertise and a strong commitment to the mission of the EABC. I thank her for stepping into this vital position and look forward to her contribution as we continue to strengthen the Council's governance and financial position.

The Council's strength lies in the active engagement of its membership - leaders from across industry, academia, and government working together to promote Australia's economic and strategic partnership with Europe. Europe as a region, encompassing the twenty-seven nations of the European Union, the United Kingdom, Switzerland, Norway, and others, remains Australia's largest economic partner. Two-way trade now exceeds **A\$155 billion** annually, with total investment exceeding **A\$3.7 trillion**. These figures underscore both the depth of our relationship and the scale of opportunity before us.

The Council remains focused on securing a **comprehensive and ambitious EU-Australia Free Trade Agreement (FTA) as the cornerstone and launchpad for modern bilateral relations**. The EABC will continue to advocate strongly for conclusion, working closely with government and industry partners to resolve the remaining issues and to deliver a framework that is fit for the 21st century and reflects our shared values and the interests of businesses and consumers in both markets.

We welcome the reinvigoration of high-level FTA discussions this year, alongside positive momentum on key EU-Australia initiatives to enliven opportunities in strategic sectors – from the launch of exploratory talks on Australia's potential association to the EU's €95.5 billion research and innovation programme, **Horizon Europe**, to the agreement to negotiate a new-age **Security and Defence Partnership**, and the rollout of the **Strategic Partnership on Sustainable Critical Raw Material Value Chains**.

Europe's pivot towards greater self-reliance in defence, symbolised by the appointment of the first European Commissioner for Defence and Space, signals new opportunities for European and Australian defence industry collaboration—particularly in advanced manufacturing, technology, and defence innovation. The **ReArm Europe Plan/Readiness 2030** will enable EU Member States to mobilise up to €650 billion from national budgets for investment in defence and resilience over four years, and access to a further €150 billion through the **Security Action for Europe** (SAFE) loan instrument.

During the year, the I was delighted to lead another highly successful annual **Business Mission to Europe**, this year visiting **Vienna, Brussels, and Warsaw**, with additional engagements in **Paris, Frankfurt, and London**. The mission brought our members together with key European stakeholders for high-level dialogue, networking, and advocacy on Australian business interests in Europe.

The Mission took place at a pivotal moment for Europe, coinciding with the NATO Leaders' Summit in The Hague and set against a backdrop of the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, shifting geostrategic dynamics, and a deteriorating risk environment. During each of our meetings - across government, international institutions, and with university and private sector leaders - the themes of international competitiveness, strategic autonomy, the importance of marrying climate ambitions with economic growth, and bolstering preparedness and security in all its dimensions shone through.

Crucial to this agenda, is of course diversifying and deepening cooperation with trusted and predictable partners, who fundamentally see the world in the same way. The EU Ambassador to Australia, HE Mr Gabriele Visentin, and I have since shared our reflections from the trip with Council members, governments, and in the media - emphasising the growing urgency and imperative for like-minded travellers, like the EU and Australia, to leverage our complementary strengths, walk the talk on free and fair trade, and buttress the rules-based order upon which our economic growth and wellbeing has been built.

Australia and Europe's shared prosperity and security depend on collaboration - in trade, energy transition, defence, digital innovation, and critical value chains. The EU's ongoing efforts to bolster technological and industrial sovereignty, security, and competitiveness, alongside Australia's focus on building economic dynamism, value-adding industries, and future resilience, create a unique window to transform shared values into shared progress.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank our **CEO Jason Collins** and our **dedicated team** for their exceptional work in delivering another highly productive year. The effective output and achievement of this small hard-working team is frequently commented on by our members. The executive team's stewardship of the Council's activities both at home and abroad continues to strengthen the voice of Australian business in Europe and European business in Australia and to ensure that our members are well informed and connected to key decision-makers.

Finally, I extend my thanks to all our **members, partners, and supporters**. Your engagement and confidence in the mission of the EABC are what make our work possible. In a world facing profound economic, technological, and geopolitical shifts, the partnership between Europe and Australia has never been more important. I look forward to working with you all as we continue to advance our collective interests in 2026 and beyond.

02. CEO'S Report

In 2025 we have held a record number of engagements, our footprint has expanded across Australia, and our policy and advocacy work has delivered real impact and results.

Unusual as it was, a quote often attributed to Vladimir Lenin was referenced earlier this year at an EABC Forum. The quote, "There are decades where nothing happens; and there are weeks where decades happen" rather accurately describes the dramatic shifts that have occurred in a short period of time. Whether it be the upending of global trade marked by the supposed 'Liberation Day', the reversal of the German fiscal 'debt brake,' the creation of a common European mechanism for defence procurement, and the rapid onset of Artificial Intelligence, transformative change is indeed happening fast

The mission of EABC remains clear, and as relevant today as in 1999, the year in which the Council was formed. Europe remains an indispensable economic partner for Australia, with growing significance in an increasingly fractured and fractious world. The potential for the relationship to grow is only constrained by increasingly outdated frameworks by which the business and institutional relationship is governed.

On a positive note, some very good progress is being made.

In April 2024 at a high-level EABC Business Forum in Sydney, Climate Change and Energy Minister Hon Chris Bowen MP and European Commissioner for Energy Kadri Simson, released their joint statement for **intensifying cooperation between Europe and Australia on energy and climate change**, and reaffirmed their "unwavering commitment" to implementing the Paris Agreement, and "accelerating the global clean energy transformation".

In May 2024 the EU and Australia inked a **bilateral** partnership to cooperate on building sustainable critical and strategic mineral value chains. As Europe seeks to diversify supply chains for the raw materials necessary for the green and digital transitions, Australia needs investment and commercial agreements to supply European industry. A high-level delegation from the European Union on critical minerals joined with EABC members a few weeks ago to discuss opportunities that are being realised by this agreement, and earlier this week, the European Investment Bank – the world's largest multilateral lender –signed an agreement with the Australian Government to further strengthen this partnership.

In September, Industry and Science Minister Hon Tim Ayres MP made the welcome announcement that the Australian Government would commence exploratory talks with the European Commission to join Horizon Europe, the world's largest research programme with a €95.5 billion funding envelope (and likely to double in size in the next EU budget cycle). Consistent advocacy by our Major Partner The Group of Eight, supported by the EABC and others, has opened the door to this potentially gamechanging new global platform for Australian industry,

researchers, and innovators.

At the International Astronautical Conference in September, Minister Ayres also announced the commencement of negotiations for a **Cooperation Agreement between Australia and the European Space Agency**, establishing a formal mechanism for Australian businesses and researchers to access European space science programmes and missions.

Dialogue is also underway on a **new Security and Defence Partnership between Australia and the European Union**.

The EABC has also advocated for the removal of barriers to investment, for greater regulatory cooperation and coherence, recognition of standards, of skills and qualifications. On the investment side we welcome the visit of the Croatian Deputy Prime Minister and Finance Minister to sign a long-awaited Double Taxation Agreement – one of several EU Member States who have long sought such a critical piece of economic infrastructure to allow investment and commercial activity to flow.

Last year I reported to our Annual General Meeting that time is of the essence for the political leadership of Australia, the European Union, and EU Member States to deliver on their commitments to economic security by finalising the EU-Australia Free Trade Agreement. In June 2018, the EABC hosted the then European Commissioner for Trade, Cecilia Malmström, at a special event in Sydney to mark the launch of negotiations. Seven years later, with interruptions due to COVID and AUKUS, the deal stands ready to be done.

Later this week, the current European Commissioner for Trade and Economic Security, Maroš Šefčovič, will visit Melbourne for bilateral talks, and to discuss cooperation between the European Union and the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP), hosted and chaired by Australian Trade and Tourism Minister Senator the Hon Don Farrell. Time is still of the essence. With renewed momentum, a current political window, and multiplying threats to both partners economic security and future prosperity, Europe and Australia need to get this deal done.

We look forward to hosting Commissioner Šefčovič with our members in Melbourne later this week.

In addition to our advocacy on these topics, the EABC has once again presented a comprehensive programme of over seventy business roundtables, delegations, and other activities around Australia, in Brussels, and in other European capitals during our annual Business Mission programme. These activities bring our members together with the individuals and institutions responsible for policy and decision-making across a broad range of

issues and industry sectors, which are detailed through this report.

Policy themes in addition to the broad trade and investment agenda include climate change and energy policy (from the renewable energy sector to climate-related reporting obligations), productivity and international competitiveness, infrastructure, defence and security, banking and finance, AI and cybersecurity, technology and innovation, migration and skills, taxation, and many others.

In addition, we have hosted many visiting European ministers, parliamentarians, senior officials, international institutions, and business delegations – at the European Union level, from EU Member States, and European countries outside of the EU. A particular highlight was to host NATO's Assistant Secretary General for Political Affairs and Security Policy late last year, and the Assistant Secretary General for Defence Industry, Innovation, and Armaments earlier this year – signifying the increased level of engagement by NATO with Australia, and Indo-Pacific partners.

The Council enormously appreciates the strength of our relationships with European and Australian official agencies and diplomatic missions which underpins our ability to engage with these visitors, and to collaborate on other activities and initiatives. The Delegation of the European Union to Australia and the Australian Embassy in Brussels, and Austrade, are indispensable partners, and our thanks to EU Ambassador HE Mr Gabriele Visentin and Australian Ambassador HE General (Rtd) Angus Campbell AO DSC, and their respective teams, for another year of excellent cooperation.

Together with the EU Delegation to Australia we have held many sessions bringing together European Ambassadors (including our recent Ambassadors Dinner in Brisbane), European Economic and Commercial Counsellors, and the network of European Chambers of Commerce in Australia are both valued colleagues and partners for cooperation and collaboration as well.

The EABC's ongoing success is only made possible by the commitment of our **member organisations** who provide the essential financial and other support towards EABC's activities. The support and participation of globally-leading organisations, both Australian and European, is fundamental to our success as a business council, and our ability to meaningfully engage with the key individuals and institutions shaping the business environment.

In addition to our thanks to government agencies and diplomatic missions, we highly value our relationships with peak business and industry organisations, including the Australian Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Australian Industry Group, the Business Council of Australia, and many others; and also with BusinessEurope, headquartered in Brussels, and other peak business and industry associations across Europe.

This year we have also continued to deepen our cooperation with State Government Departments and Agencies, in particular with our partner **Investment NSW**, and informal partnerships with Global Victoria and Trade & Investment Queensland. Brisbane will continue to be a focus for an expanded programme in Queensland, and we look forward to our ongoing engagement with the Queensland Government, the City of Brisbane, and other partners as we continue to build our presence and range of activities.

The Secretariat team sincerely thanks our Chair **Duncan** Lewis AO DSC CSC, Deputy Chairs Vicki Thomson and Professor the Hon Brendan O'Connor, our Treasurers Adam Lai and Jade Dixon, and all members of the EABC Board and Corporate Council for their leadership and ongoing support.

Finally, our talented and incredibly dedicated team continues to excel and outperform and break new ground. To all our team members: Jo Johns, Caragh Heugh Johnson, Carolina Romero, Manon Koopman, Sarah Kostoglou, Gigi De Leon, and Irene Latoa – thank you for another exceptional year.

Over the coming twelve months will continue to seek to break new ground, to advocate for outstanding and emerging issues, and to leverage the important new momentum created this year. We look forward with enthusiasm and excitement to working with all our members and partners in the year ahead.

STATEMENT OF INCOME & EXPENDITURE AT 30 JUNE 2025

FY25 has seen a small surplus result from a break-even result in FY24. Total income for the year was \$1,765k (FY24: \$1,597k) and total expenses for the year were \$1,725k (FY24: \$1,597k). The result was a surplus for the year of \$40k (FY24: 1k). Stable membership renewals, new member revenues, and cost controls have achieved this modest surplus result.

FINANCIAL RESULTS AT 30 JUNE 2025

Following a flat bottom line FY24, the past financial year saw attention on securing revenue by expanding membership as well as management of costs. Increased travel costs have been associated with participation in ministerial visits, delegations and ongoing advocacy efforts and activities across expanding centres of operation. Significant efforts have been made to retain existing memberships, and new memberships secured in FY25 will flow through as revenue in FY26.

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION AT 30 JUNE 2025

Cash at Bank was \$1,027k (FY24: 561k) with total receivables of \$697k (including membership invoices raised in June 2025 for FY26 - with a corresponding entry of \$986k as 'Deferred Revenue'). Deferred income and accrued expenses are recorded in the report as a result of business mission activity outside of the reporting period and membership fees received in advance. Total members funds as at 30 June 2025 were \$546k (FY24: 506k).

AUDIT

BDO has undertaken the audit and preparation of the EABC financial report for FY25. An unqualified audit report was approved by Directors for presentation to members at the Council's Annual General Meeting on 19 November 2025.

DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

The Directors of the European Australian Business Council Limited (EABC/the Council) present their report for the period 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025.

The principal activities of the EABC during the 12 month period to 30 June 2025 were unchanged, and include the presentation of a programme of business roundtables, policy fora, briefings, meetings, delegations and other activities for our members and partners.

The net surplus for the year was \$40k (2024: surplus \$1,495).

The better result achieved in the current reporting year was mainly due to higher membership revenue from new and renewing members.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of European Australian Business Council (the Entity), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2025, the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, the statement of changes in equity and the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial report, including material accounting policy information, and the declaration by those charged with governance. In our opinion the accompanying financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, financial position of the Entity as at 30 June 2025 and of its financial performance for the year ended on that date in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures.

EABC 2024 AGM and Reception, 12 November 2024, Sydney

We we delighted to welcome the Premier of New South Wales, the **Hon Chris Minns MP**, to deliver a special address to the AGM in 2024. Premier Minns expressed his commitment to ensuring that NSW continued to be an attractive destination for European companies and for Australian exporters to Europe by working in partnership to deliver sustainable economy prosperity to both regions. The AGM Reception which followed included addresses from our parliamentary host the **Hon Ben Franklin MLC**, President of the Legislative Council, the **Hon Greg Piper MP**, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, and guest of honour **Senator the Hon Don Farrell**, Federal Minister for Trade and Tourism, and Special Minister of State. Minister Farrell highlighted the strong historical and cultural partnership between the EU and Australia, emphasising the vast number of economic opportunities available to further deepen collaboration. He reiterated his commitment to concluding a mutually beneficial EU-Australia free trade agreement and fostering greater cooperation across strategic pillars of the relationship, from energy and critical minerals, to R&D and innovation, as well as joint efforts to uphold the rules-based international order.

John Lonsdale PSM, Chair, APRA, 25 November 2025, Sydney

It was a great pleasure to host John Lonsdale, Chair of the Australian Prudential Regulation Authority, for a boardroom discussion on the importance of financial and operational resilience in a time of geopolitical volatility, economic uncertainty, and rapid technological change. Mr Lonsdale highlighted the importance of defending the rules based international order and maintaining Australia's expansive international trade and investment ties, and access to capital markets, while seeking to better understand and prepare for geopolitical shocks which may spill over into the financial system.

Ambassador Boris Ruge, Deputy Secretary-General, North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO), 9 December 2025, Sydney

The EABC was delighted to have Ambassador Boris Ruge, NATO Assistant Secretary General for Political Affairs and Security Policy, join us for an important discussion during his visit to Australia. The roundtable provided a valuable opportunity to share insights and lessons from various theatres of conflict and crisis, and the opportunities and barriers facing intensified cooperation to address shared security challenges. In particular, the discussion focused on levers to increase defence and aerospace industry coordination to improve interoperability; drive the development of new joint advanced capabilities; and enable the scale-up of industrial production capacities, including to facilitate joint efforts to support Ukraine.

EABC Delegation to Brussels, 3-7 February 2025, Sydney

In the first week of February, EABC Chair Duncan Lewis AO DSC CSC and EABC CEO Jason Collins visited Brussels and Paris for a series of meetings with the new European Commission, European Parliament, Australia's Heads of Mission in London, Berlin, Paris and Brussles, and other key stakeholders. The visit aimed to establish new, and to deepen longstanding, relationships, while underlining the importance of enhanced bilateral cooperation in an increasingly complex and uncertain geopolitical environment. It also provided the important opportunity to continue to build the programme for the EABC's 2025 Business Mission to Europe this June.

Business Forum, Reception, and Boardroom Dinner, 12 February 2025, Sydney

For the official launch of the EABC's 2025 programme, we were pleased to host a number of activities during the visit of **Maria Martin-Prat**, Deputy Director-General, European Commission Directorate-General for Trade and Economic Security. We were delighted to also welcome NSW Minister for Industry and Trade **Hon Anoulack Chanthivong MP**, President of the NSW Legislative Council **Hon Ben Franklin MLC**, and members of Deputy Director-General's accompanying delegation to Sydney, including EU Ambassador to Australia, **HE Mr Gabriele Visentin**, and EU-Australia FTA Chief Negotiator, **Christophe Kiener**. Our events followed the inaugural EU-Australia Strategic Trade, Investment and Economic Dialogue in Canberra. The dialogue, established under the EU-Australia Framework Agreement, is a welcome annual high-level mechanism to engage on strategic trade priorities, bilateral trade opportunities, and the expanding economic security agenda.

Kurt Vandenberghe, Director-General for Climate Action, European Commission, 21 February 2025, Sydney

The EABC welcomed the opportunity to host Kurt Vandenberghe, EU Director-General for Climate Action ahead of the release of the EU's highly anticipated Clean Industrial Deal. The Director-General joined the EABC for a valuable dialogue during his visit to Australia on the EU's ambitious plans to reframe its decarbonisation strategy into a modernisation agenda - driving economic growth, competitiveness, resilience and future clean tech industries, while accelerating the transition to a carbon-neutral and circular economy.













Hon David Coleman MP, Shadow Minister for Foreign Affairs, 28 February 2025, Sydney

The EABC welcomed the opportunity to host recently appointed Shadow Minister for Foreign Affairs Hon David Coleman MP for a discussion on the Coalition's key foreign, economic & security policy priorities ahead of the federal election. Participants discussed the urgency of strengthening our strategic relationships with European partners during a period of significant geopolitical volatility, including finalising the long-overdue FTA with the EU, as well as ensuring the effective implementation of the AU-UK FTA and AUKUS.

EABC International Women's Day Business Forum, 6 March 2025, Sydney

We are most grateful to EABC Board Member and ING Australia CEO, **Melanie Evans**, for once again co-hosting this annual event. This year's UN International Women's Day theme, 'March Forward', provided an opportunity to examine the pathways to achieving equal participation in the economy to drive future productivity, innovation and prosperity. We were delighted to be joined by AEMO Chair **Professor Mary O'Kane AC** for a keynote address, followed by a fireside chat with Melanie Evans, and a panel discussion with speakers including Head of Strategy & Innovation for Ericsson, **Sarah Goss**, and Human Resources Director for ACCIONA Energy, **Jane Campbell**, and EABC Corporate Council Member **Hon Dr Annabelle Bennett AC SC**.

EABC Annual Federal Budget Dinner, 25 March 2025, Sydney

In the leadup to a tightly contested federal election it was a great pleasure to be back at Parliament House for our annual Federal Budget Dinner, co-hosted by National Australia Bank. We welcomed several Ministers and Shadow Ministers who provided participants with an update on their portfolio priorities, including Senator the Hon Don Farrell MP, Hon Madeleine King MP, Hon Julie Collins MP, Hon Patrick Gorman MP, Hon Dr Andrew Leigh MP, Senator James Paterson, and Hon Kevin Hogan MP. Our esteemed panel, who dissected the political economic, and sector-specific elements of the Budget package included EABC Corporate Council Members Kate Carnell AO, the Hon Andrew Robb AO, and Angus Trigg, SECNewgate Managing Partner.

Allegra Spender MP, Federal Member for Wentworth, 1 April 2025, Sydney

The EABC was delighted to welcome Allegra Spender MP for an important discussion in the lead up to the 2025 Federal Election. The session provided the opportunity to discuss the outlook for economic reform in Australia; key challenges and opportunities facing business and industry; and the priority actions Australia must take to face a changing geopolitical and economic landscape. In this regard, Ms Spender highlighted the urgency of investing in Australia's economic competitiveness and drivers of productivity, defence and security, relations with predictable and likeminded international partners, and preserving the social contract.

Sir Lynton Crosby AO, Co-Founder and Executive Chairman, CT Group, 1 May 2025, Sydney

The EABC welcomed the opportunity to be joined by Sir Lynton Crosby AO, Co-Founder and Executive Chairman of CT Group, for a timely discussion on the dynamics shaping the Australian and international political landscape and defining the course of 2025 Australian Federal Election. Held on the eve of the federal election, the discussion delved into how these global and domestic forces are influencing the priorities of political contenders, their campaign strategies, and ability to effectively cut through to persuade voters. Drawing on his extensive experience across both political and corporate sectors, Sir Crosby offered invaluable insights into the strategic dynamics of Australian election campaigns, the broader political system, as well as the key drivers shaping voter behaviour.

HE Mr Pierre-André Imbert, Ambassador of France to Australia, 14 May 2025, Sydney

In May, the EABC was honoured to be joined by HE Mr Pierre-Andre Imbert, Ambassador of France to Australia, for an insightful discussion on the dynamic bilateral business relationship and opportunities to further deepen cooperation across security, innovation and industrial capability. Ambassador Imbert outlined how France is navigating a drastically changed geopolitical landscape in relation to its national interests. Australia and France share a trusted relationship, built on strong people-to-people links and cultural ties, extensive economic ties and shared strategic priorities. The Ambassador highlighted several key opportunities amidst heightened global and economic uncertainties - emphasising, as an example, the importance of supply chain resilience in sectors such as defence and critical minerals.













HE Ms Natasha Smith, Australian Ambassador to Germany, 31 July 2025, Brisbane

HE Ms Natasha Smith joined the EABC during her tip back to Australia for an update on Germany's political and economic landscape; the new German government's priorities; and key areas of opportunity in the bilateral relationship. Ambassador Smith underscored the increasing importance of trusted partnerships in today's shifting geopolitical landscape. Amid rising geopolitical uncertainty, Germany and Australia stand out as natural partners, well positioned to deepen ties to support diversification, resilience, innovation, and unlock new commercial and R&D opportunities, particularly in clean energy, critical minerals, and advanced technology sectors.

Hon Danny Pearson MP, Victorian Minister for Economic Growth & Jobs, and Minister for Finance, 5 August 2025, Melbourne

The EABC welcomed Hon Danny Pearson MP for a thought-provoking discussion on the State's business and investment environment; the Government's economic growth strategy; and opportunities for sensible reforms to spur productivity, business dynamism, innovation, and investment. Reflecting on a period marked by geopolitical uncertainty, volatile global trade, and fierce international competition, Minister Pearson opened with a clear-eyed assessment of Victoria's strategic landscape, the economic challenges, and opportunities it faces. Participants also discussed Victoria's strategic engagement with Europe, including levers to optimise flows of trade, investment, R&D, and expertise in emerging technologies and future-facing sectors; and driving greater collaboration between government, business, and universities in priority sectors for the State.

Hon Daniel Mookhey MLC, Treasurer of New South Wales, 14 August 2025, Sydney

The EABC had the opportunity to reengage with the Hon Daniel Mookhey MLC for a valuable dialogue on the 2025-26 NSW State Budget; the Federal Treasurer's Economic Reform Roundtable; and the outlook for comprehensive reform to reignite productivity growth in and Australia. Treasurer Mookhey highlighted some of the next steps that the NSW Government will be prioritising to unlock economic and productivity growth, with a focus on boosting efficiency, innovation, and attracting capital investment. Forthcoming measures include significant regulatory simplification; comprehensive planning reform to ramp up the speed of approvals and delivery, starting with \$17.7 million announced in the 2025-26 Budget to establish a new Investment Delivery Authority to fast-track major projects outside of housing; and \$80 million to position NSW as a global leader in innovation and tech though the State's recently released Innovation Blueprint.

Danielle Wood, Chair, Productivity Commission, 29 August 2025, Melbourne

Following the Government's Economic Reform Roundtable, the EABC met with Danielle Wood to discuss the opportunities to reignite Australia's productivity growth - as a critical driver of improved living standards, intergenerational equity, and economic growth and resilience. Australia is grappling with a pivotal moment in its economic trajectory, with growing recognition of the urgent need to tackle concerns around stagnating productivity growth and international competitiveness, subdued business investment and dynamism, slow adoption and diffusion of new technologies, cumbersome regulation and a slow planning system, and a labour market struggling to adapt to technological change and demographic shifts.

EABC Delegation to Parliament House Canberra, 2-3 September 2025

The EABC was delighted to take a delegation of 30 senior business and organisational leaders to Parliament House in Canberra for a direct dialogue with Ministers and senior staffers on the Australian Government's agenda for its second term. We were honoured to be joined by Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Defence, Hon Richard Marles MP; Special Minister of State, Minister for Trade & Tourism, and Deputy Leader of the Government in the Senate, Senator the Hon Don Farrell; Minister for Defence Industry & Pacific Island Affairs, Hon Pat Conroy MP; Minister for Skills and Training, Hon Andrew Giles MP; Assistant Minister to the Prime Minister, for the Public Service & Employment and Workplace Relations, Hon Patrick Gorman MP, Assistant Minister for Productivity, Competition, Charities and Treasury, Hon Dr Andrew Leigh MP; Assistant Minister for Foreign Affairs & Trade, and Immigration, Hon Matt Thistlethwaite MP. We also met with Principal Private Secretary to the Prime Minister, David Epstein; Political Editor for the Australian, Geoff Chambers; Laurence Coleman Chief of Staff to the Minister for Resources & Northern Australia Hon Madeleine King MP; Michael Belchamber, Senior Adviser to the Minister for Climate and Energy Hon Chris Bowen MP; Joseph Solomon, Chief of Staff to the Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development & Local Government, Hon Catherine King MP; and Gemma Paech, Deputy Chief of Staff to the Minister for Employment and Workplace Relations, Hon Amanda Rishworth MP.













Brad Battin MP, Victorian Leader of the Opposition, Shadow Minister for Small and Medium Business, 17 September 2025, Melbourne

The EABC welcomed Brad Battin MP for a valuable discussion on Victoria's business and investment environment; its increasingly important strategic and economic relationships with Europe; and the development of key policies the Opposition will take to the 2026 State election. We were also pleased to be joined by Shadow Minister for Trade and Investment, Finance, and Manager of Opposition Business, **Bridget Vallence MP**, who underlined the Opposition's support for unlocking opportunities for trade, investment, and innovation cooperation with European partners.

Michele Bullock, Governor of the Reserve Bank of Australia, 23 September 2025, Sydney

The Council met with Michele Bullock to discuss the domestic and global economic environment; the RBA's priorities as it undergoes a period of significant transformation; and initiatives to spur Australia's productivity, economic dynamism, and resilience. The Governor outlined the significant challenges advanced economies have faced in curbing post-pandemic inflationary pressures, and the strategy undertaken by the RBA to reduce headline inflation from its 2022 peak of 7.8% to within its target range of 2-3%. Turning to the economic outlook, she outlined the RBA's approach to navigating disruptive trends including geopolitical volatility, trade policy uncertainty and shifting trade patterns, rapid technological advancements, and an increasingly challenging cyber threat landscape.



The EABC was honoured to welcome Hon Andrew Charlton MP for a timely discussion on the Australian Government's development of a national artificial intelligence plan, and strategic thinking on technology adoption and diffusion, digital connectivity, data centres, and the expansion of other digital and supporting infrastructure. The Minister highlighted the Government's focus on ensuring that Australia is poised to harness the opportunities of the unprecedented transformation that artificial intelligence will catalyse over the coming decade for business, the economy, and future socioeconomic prosperity.

EABC & The Group of Eight Joint Board Dinner, 16 October 2025, Melbourne

The Council was delighted to hold our annual Joint Board Dinner with the **Vice Chancellors of The Group of Eight Universities**, co-convened by EABC Deputy Chair and Go8 Chief Executive, **Vicki Thomson**, and the Go8 Chair, **Professor Mark Scott AO**. This year we had the privilege of welcoming **David Gall**, CEO of the National Reconstruction Fund Corporation to lead a discussion on the opportunities for more effective collaboration between government, industry, universities, and European partners, to drive a more dynamic, competitive, and resilient economy in the face of rapid technological change and geostrategic volatility. Following David's address, key topics of discussion were led by by **Lieutenant General Michelle McGuinness CSC**, National Cyber Security Coordinator, and members of the EABC and Go8 Boards.

The EU's Critical Raw Materials Strategy Roundtable, 20 October 2025, Sydney

Ahead of the International Mining and Resources Conference (IMARC), the EABC met with key European Commission, European Investment Bank (EIB), and EU Member State policymakers to discuss the EU's plans for strategic autonomy in critical raw materials (CRM) and the opportunities this presents for Australia. We were privileged to hear from Joaquim Nunes de Almeida, Director at the European Commission's Directorate-General for Internal Market, Industry, Entrepreneurship, and SMEs, on the EU's strategy to secure and build sustainable and resilient CRM supply chains; and from Nicola Beer, Vice President of the EIB, who outlined the bank's growing role in financing critical raw materials projects in Europe, as well as its intention to seek investment opportunities and partnerships with Australian companies.

Geraldine Slattery, President, BHP Australia, 28 October 2025, Melbourne

The EABC had the pleasure of welcoming Geraldine Slattery for an engaging discussion with members in Melbourne. In the year which marks 140 years since BHP's incorporation, Ms Slattery provided a tour de force of the areas of strategic priority which have driven its success - from achieving scale and disciplined capital allocation to investing in partnerships, internal resilience, operational excellence, culture, and innovation. The dialogue traversed the key challenges and opportunities shaping Australia's resources sector amid a period of geopolitical and trade volatility; intensified international competition; and major industrial transformation driven by a shift to a netzero economy, technological innovation, and evolving market demands and demand centres.













Overview

Each year, the EABC undertakes a high-level Business Mission to Europe as an initiative to strengthen bilateral relationships with European political leaders, institutions, officials, peak business and industry associations, policy think tanks, universities, and research institutions

The delegation travels to Brussels and London, as the political capitals of the European Union (EU), and the United Kingdom (UK), and to other key political and commercial centers in Europe.

Since 2006, the missions have included destinations such as Amsterdam, Antwerp, Berlin, Bern, Bratislava, Brussels, Budapest, Copenhagen, Dublin, Frankfurt, Geneva, Hamburg, Helsinki, Istanbul, Lisbon, London, Madrid, Malmö, Milan, Munich, Paris, Rome, Rotterdam, Stockholm, Strasbourg, The Hague, Toulouse, Venice, Vienna, Warsaw, and Zurich.

During these programmes, delegates have engaged with European Commission Presidents, Vice-Presidents, and Commissioners; European Parliament Vice-Presidents and Committee Chairs; leaders of the European Central Bank and other key institutions; Heads of State and Government; national Ministers, heads of departments, and central banks; and leaders from business, universities, and peak employer and industry organisations across Europe.

This year the EABC delegation travelled to Vienna, Brussels, and Warsaw, with side visits to Paris, Frankfurt, and London.

Delegates

The 2025 Mission was led by EABC Chair **Duncan Lewis AO DSC CSC** (Thales Australia), EABC Deputy Chair, **Vicki Thomson** (Group of Eight), together with EABC CEO **Jason Collins**, and EABC COO **Jo Johns**. We were delighted to once again be joined by EABC Honorary Board Member and Ambassador of the European Union to Australia, **HE Mr Gabriele Visentin**.

Mission Objectives and Support

The EABC's annual Business Mission provides opportunities for Australian business and organisational leaders to engage in a direct dialogue with European leaders on key developments in Europe, Australia, and globally.

Priority areas for engagement include political and economic governance, responses to a rapidly changing geopolitical environment, trade and investment policy and negotiations, industrial policy and sectoral priorities, R&D and innovation, energy and decarbonisation, defence and security, digital transformation, cybersecurity, transport and mobility, infrastructure, and the constantly evolving regulatory landscape.

Confronted by increasingly complex landscape - in which economic, R&D, and industrial policy, defence and security, and international relations have become increasingly intertwined - the 2025 Mission offered a valuable opportunity to garner insights into the European response, shifting priorities, and to profile the strategic importance of deepening collaboration with Australia across various pillars of the relationship.

The visit provided the timely occasion to press the case for the swift conclusion of an ambitious and mutually-rewarding FTA with the EU; to ensure the effective implementation and leveraging of opportunities presented by the AUKUS agreement and the Australia-UK FTA; and to explore emerging sectoral opportunities where Europe's and Australia's priorities, capabilities, and natural advantages are complementary.

These missions also offer valuable opportunity for Australian business and organisational leaders to work with Australian Government representatives in Europe to profile and promote Australia's economic credentials and capabilities, and to unlock new opportunities for bilateral cooperation.

The 2025 Business Mission was greatly supported by the Australian Missions in Paris, Vienna, Brussels, Warsaw, and London; Austrade and Australian Treasury Officials across Europe; the Delegation of the European Union to Australia; and the Embassies, Consulates-General, Trade Commissions, and bilateral Chambers of Commerce of France, Germany, Austria, Poland, and the United Kingdom.

Paris, 19-20 June

Ahead of the EABC's programme of meetings in Paris, delegates had the opportunity to visit the 55th International Paris Air Show on Thursday 19 June, the world's largest air show and aerospace-industry exhibition showcasing the groundbreaking innovations set to redefine the future of the sector. The group was hosted by EABC members Flying Whales Chair & CEO Sebastien Bougon, Safran Group Chair Ross McInnes, and Safran Electronics and Defense Australasia CEO Peter Harris, and had the opportunity to engage with industry leaders across civil aviation, defense, and space technology. On Friday 20 June, the Paris programme commenced with a briefing from Australia's Ambassador to France HE Ms Lynette Wood and Austrade's Investment Commissioner Jean-Baptiste Nithart at the Australian Embassy. Later that morning, delegates participated in a France-Australia Business Forum, kindly hosted by Thierry Mallet, Chair of MEDEF International's France-Australia Business Council and Group Chair & CEO of Transdev. The delegation was joined by senior representatives from MEDEF's membership from the financial services, energy, transport, infrastructure, and automotive sectors, as well as representatives from the French Ministry of Europe and Foreign Affairs. Over lunch at Le Clarence, the group met with David Hubert-Delisle, Director of Business France's International Network, for a discussion on France's strategic economic priorities; initiatives to attract FDI, boost international competitiveness, and strengthn sovereign capabilities; and emerging trade and investment opportunities with Australia, with a particular focus on decarbonisation and digitalisation. Next, the delegation travelled to the Palais de l'Élysée to meet with Victoire Vandeville, Advisor in the Cabinet of President Emmanuel Macron on Attractiveness, Export, Trade, Policy, and Tourism. The discussion provided delegates with an opportunity to garner insights into the French Government's strategic positioning to navigate geopolitical and macroeconomic headwinds; implications for Australia of the domestic political landscape in France; and initiatives to drive key priorities of the President. That afternoon the delegation was welcomed to the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), by Secretary-General Mathias Cormann, for a timely discussion on the implications of shifting geopolitical dynamics, rising protectionism, and trade policy volatility for the rules-based international order and global economic system. The programme in Paris was concluded with a cocktail reception kindly hosted by HE Ms Lynette Wood at the Australian Embassy, bringing together leaders of French industry, universities, and the public service, and with a special operatic medley performance from multi-awardwinning Australian mezzo soprano, Sally-Anne Russell.



On Saturday 21 June, delegates travelled to Frankfurt, for a site visit to EABC Corporate Partner **Vulcan Energy's Lionheart Project** - the world's first carbon neutral, integrated lithium and renewable energy project. We were hosted by Vulcan's Executive Chair **Dr Francis Wedin** and Lead Independent Director & Deputy Chair **Angus Barker**, for a private tour of the facility and briefing on the innovative project. Vulcan is developing Europe's first locally produced supply of battery-quality lithium for the battery and EV industries, while utilising the coproduct of its extraction process to provide renewable energy for district heating.

Vienna Programme, 22-23 June

On Sunday 22 June, the full delegation gathered in Vienna for the official launch of the EABC's 2025 Mission. Following a welcome lunch at the **Almanac Palais**, delegates were joined by Australia's Ambassador to Austria, **HE Mr Ian Biggs**, and Australian Treasury Representative for Europe, **Dr John Swieringa**, for an insightful briefing on developments in the political, policy, and economic environment in Austria, and Europe more broadly. That evening, the delegation had the pleasure of engaging in a discussion over dinner with members of the **Vienna Airport Supervisory Board**, including **Lars Bespolka**, **Dr Günther Ofner**, and **Boris Schucht**, facilitated by EABC Board Member **David Whiteley**, **IFM Investors**' Global Head of External Relations. The high-level dialogue provided a unique opportunity to discuss the airport's operations, challenges, and strategic direction; as well as the outlook for the global aviation industry, including decarbonisation, digitalisation, and security of critical infrastructure; the business and investment environment in Austria and Europe; and the outlook for the energy transition in Europe as priorities of energy security, international competitiveness, and strategic autonomy come to the fore.













Monday's programme began with a visit to the headquarters of EABC Corporate Partner Frequentis, where we were hosted by Global CEO, Norbert Haslacher, and Managing Director for Australasia, Martin Rampl. The visit showcased Frequentis' contributions to critical infrastructure resilience, digital transformation, and sustainable development across Europe, Australia, and other global markets. Following a tour, including demonstrations of some of the company's exciting new solutions, the delegation engaged in a constructive dialogue on mechanisms to incentivise business investment in R&D and to foster effective innovation ecosystems through government-industryuniversity cooperation. Later that morning, the delegation visited Austria's Federal Ministry for European and International Affairs for a valuable dialogue with Secretary-General, Nikolaus Marschik, and Director-General for Economic Affairs and Special Envoy for Ukraine Reconstruction, Elisabeth Kornfeind. Delegates were provided with insights into Austria's evolving strategic priorities with regard to foreign, trade, and defence and security policy as it confronts a deteriorating risk landscape. The delegation was then welcomed to the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) headquarters for a high-level dialogue and lunch with Director-General for Research, Dr Ayed S. Al-Qahtani, and other members of the Secretariat's leadership team. The engagement offered a valuable opportunity to gain insights into the organisation's strategic priorities, its pivotal role in the global energy landscape, and its forecasting of global energy markets and demand on the pathway to net-zero emissions by 2050.

The programme continued at Austria's Federal Ministry for Economy, Energy and Tourism, where we held a valuable exchange with Secretary-General Dr Severin Gruber and Head of Directorate for Foreign Economic Relations, Dr Elisabeth Weissenboeck. The discussion explored the growth potential of the Austria-Australia economic relationship, highlighting synergies in capabilities, natural advantages, and sectors of shared strategic priority, as well as the importance of concluding an EU-Australia FTA. That afternoon, the delegation participated in a Research and Industry Dialogue, bringing together leaders from Austria's innovation ecosystem and the public service including Barbara Weitgruber, Director General for Scientific Research and International Relations at the Federal Ministry of Education, Science and Research, Henriette Spyra, Director General for Innovation and Technology at the Ministry for Climate Action, Environment, Energy, Mobility, Innovation and Technology, and Dr Stefan Riegler, Director for Innovation Strategies and Cooperation at the Federal Ministry for Economy, Energy and Tourism. We concluded our programme in Vienna with an Austrian-Australian Business Roundtable followed by a networking reception hosted at the Austrian Federal Economic Chamber (WKO). Speakers included WKO Vice-President Wolfgang Hesoun, Advantage Austria Deputy Director-General, Astrid Fixl-Plummer, former Austrian Minister for Labour and Economy and incoming Governor of the Austrian National Bank, Professor Martin Kocher, Austrian Trade Commissioner in Sydney Ulrike Straka, members of the delegation, and senior Austrian business leaders. The event brought together over 80 senior representatives from Austrian and Australian government, industry, and academia to strengthen bilateral ties and explore new opportunities for collaboration across areas of shared strategic interest from the net-zero transition, to critical minerals, defence and aerospace, emerging technologies, advanced manufacturing, and institutional investment.

Brussels Programme, 24-25 June

Held in the midst of the NATO leaders' summit, the Brussels visit commenced with a timely briefing over lunch from Deputy Head of Australia's Mission to the EU, NATO, Belgium, and Luxembourg, David Brightling and Australia's Military Representative to NATO and the EU, Air Vice-Marshal Dianne Turton. The delegation was then hosted at the European Commission's Directorate-General for Research and Innovation for a valuable meeting with Deputy Director-General Signe Ratso to discuss how the EU is positioning research and innovation at the centre of the competitiveness and strategic autonomy agendas. The dialogue further covered the Australian and EU responses to recent threats to international research funding; approaches to R&D security and international collaboration on dual-use technologies and in sensitive sectors; and the opportunity Horizon Europe presents to deepen international R&D collaboration as a driver of productivity, economic diversification, job creation and future prosperity. Next, delegates headed to the European Investment Bank (EIB) for a meeting with Director General Kim Jørgensen on developments in the investment environment in Europe; the implications of recent geopolitical turmoil on capital markets; the strategy for financing the EU's new strategic priorities; new initiatives under development to crowd in private investment in strategic areas; and the opportunities to deepen cooperation with trusted partners like Australia, including streamlining high-quality flows of investment through













an Australia-EU FTA. That evening, the delegation was welcomed to the **Ambassador's Residence** for a cocktail reception hosted by Deputy Head of Mission **David Brightling**. During the event, which brought together leaders from prominent think tanks, business and industry associations, participants were addressed by guest of honour **Seán Kelly MEP**, Chair of the **European Parliament's Delegation for Relations with Australia and New Zealand (DANZ)**.

On Wednesday, the programme began with a working breakfast with Bernd Lange MEP, Chair of the European Parliament's Committee on International Trade and the Conference of Committee Chairs. Mr Lange provided delegates with an update on how current geopolitical and domestic political dynamics are shaping the strategic agenda within European institutions, in particular galvanising support for a tactical pivot towards a more autonomous, competitive, innovative, and assertive Europe, capable of effectively defending its interests and values on the global stage. Later that morning, the delegation was welcomed to AmCham EU for a dialogue with CEO Malte Lohan and Chair Liam Benham, who also serves as President of EU, NATO and Government Affairs Europe at Boeing International. The roundtable provided a timely opportunity to discuss the new US administration's impact on the global trade, economic, and security environment; the outlook for the transatlantic economic relationship; the EU's changing regulatory landscape; and the implications of a quickly evolving geostrategic environment for Australian business. The programme continued with a meeting with Markus Beyrer, Director General of BusinessEurope, the confederation of national employers' federations representing over 20 million companies across Europe. Mr Beyrer provided delegates with a valuable update on the economic, business, and investment environment in Europe; reactions to the Commission's new suite of policy proposals targeting competitiveness, innovation, security, and investment attractiveness; the state of the EU's trade negotiations and economic relations with major trading partners; and the international challenges facing industry.

Following a delegation lunch at the Residence Palace, we were joined by Dārta Tentere, who leads on the Australia-EU FTA and economic security in the Cabinet of European Commissioner for Trade and Economic Security Commissioner Maroš Šefčovič. The discussion focussed on the economic and strategic imperative of concluding a mutuallyrewarding Australia-EU FTA to deliver on shared priorities of economic and trade diversification, competitiveness, reindustrialisation, and the development of sovereign capabilities with trusted partners along critical value chains. That afternoon, delegates were welcomed to the European Commission's Directorate-General for Climate Action for a meeting with Deputy Director-General Jan Dusík. Mr Dusík updated delegates on the progress of implementing the European Green Deal - the flagship priority of the first von der Leyen Commission - with member states on track to meet the legally binding 2030 targets of a 55% reduction in emissions and a 42.5% minimum share of renewables in final energy consumption. Looking forward, he outlined the Commission's raft of new initiatives to marry its ambitious climate action and environmental protection goals with new leading priorities of economic security and competitiveness. The programme in Brussels concluded with a boardroom dinner in the Grand Place with special guest Karel Lanoo, CEO of leading independent think tank, Centre for European Policy Studies (CEPS). The discussion explored the political, economic, and geostrategic shifts shaping Europe's and Australia's risk landscape and policy direction; outcomes of the NATO summit, including the implications for partners such as Australia; and opportunities to strengthen cooperation between the EU and Australia, as likeminded partners navigating an increasingly complex global environment.

Warsaw Programme, 26-27 June

On Thursday the delegation travelled to Warsaw, where they were met for a working lunch by Australia's Ambassador to Poland, the Czech Republic, and Lithuania, **HE Mr Benjamin Hayes**, Defence Attaché **Colonel Paul Graham**, and Trade Commissioner **Kelly Matthews**. Ahead of meetings with key Polish government and industry leaders, delegates were provided with keen insights into Poland's economic, political, and security landscape; its increasing political weight within Europe and leadership role in European defence and support for Ukraine; notable achievements during its six month presidency of the Council of the EU; and key developments in the bilateral relationship. Delegates then visited the **Polish Ministry for Climate and Environment** for a meeting with Secretary of State **Krzysztof Bolesta** and Undersecretary of State and Chief Geologist **Krzysztof Galos**. Mr Bolesta highlighted the shift underway within Europe to more closely link climate and energy targets with an effective industrial strategy to ensure decarbonisation is an engine for economic and jobs growth. Noting the













importance of heeding the lessons from Russia's invasion of Ukraine to ensure that countries do not swap one overdependency (fossil fuel imports) for another (clean technology imports), he highlighted priorities of bolstering sovereign capabilities as well as trade, investment, and R&D cooperation with trusted partners like Australia. That evening, the delegation was generously hosted for a cocktail reception at the **Ambassador's Residence** by **HE Mr Benjamin Hayes**. The engagement brought together a distinguished group of industry, university, and government leaders, in support of forging stronger Poland-Australia ties as trusted and increasingly important strategic partners. We were particularly honoured to be joined by Polish Secretaries of State **Krzysztof Bolesta** (Climate & Environment), **Wladyslaw Bartoszewski** (Foreign Affairs), and **Jakub Jaworowski** (State Assets), and Chair of the Sejm's Foreign Affairs Committee and Special Envoy of the Polish Government for the Reconstruction of Ukraine, **Paweł Kowal**.

Friday morning's programme commenced with a Poland-Australia Business Forum hosted at Confederation Lewiatan by President Marek Gorski and Director-General Malgorzata Mroczkowska-Horne. Speakers shared insights into the political, economic, and business environments in Poland and Australia, the policy outlook in areas of shared strategic interest, and the implications of recent geopolitical shifts. We then had the pleasure of hosting a boardroom lunch at the Hotel Bristol with Michał Jaros, Secretary of State in the Polish Ministry for Economic Development and Technology, and Dr Pawel Pudlowski, Vice President of the Polish Investment and Trade Agency (PAIH). The discussion explored the Polish Government's industrial priorities; its strong support for the establishment of facilitative frameworks, such as the EU-Australia FTA and proposed Security and Defence Partnership; and various areas of bilateral opportunity across the net-zero transition, critical minerals downstream value chains, digital economy, and defence industry and dual-use technologies. The delegation was then welcomed at the Polish Ministry of Foreign Affairs by Secretary of State Władysław Teofil Bartoszewski. Mr Bartoszewski shared his insights into the dynamics shaping the Polish Government's evolving strategic objectives and approach to economic, defence and security, and foreign policy, including a sharpened focus on industrial competitiveness, technological sovereignty, and diversifying economic relations with trusted partners in the Indo-Pacific, including Australia. Next, delegates visited the Poland's National Development Bank for a productive meeting with Managing Director Marcin Prusak, Board Member Jarosław Dąbrowski, Chief Economist Mateusz Walewski, and Managing Director of International Relations Piotr Jabłoński. The delegation was provided with a useful overview of Poland's economic outlook; the geopolitical risks shaping the Bank's strategy and priorities; and its pivotal role in financing, coordinating, and mobilising (public and private) strategic investments to support Ukraine's recovery, rebuilding, and modernisation. That afternoon, the delegation visited the POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews, located on the site of the former Warsaw Ghetto. Delegates were taken on a private tour of the museum's interactive exhibitions, which present 1000 years of Jewish heritage and culture in the Polish lands. The first week's programme concluded with the traditional Friday evening delegation dinner, held at the eclectic U Fukiera, Warsaw's oldest restaurant where there were reflections on the take aways from the intensive first week of meetings and discussions the priorities for the upcoming visit to London.

London Programme, 30 June - 2 July

The delegation reassembled in London on Monday evening, kicking off the programme with a boardroom dinner at **One Aldwych** with EABC Corporate Council Member **Hon Brendan Nelson AO**, President of Boeing Global. The dialogue focussed on the challenges that the changed international landscape poses for defence, aerospace, and dual use sectors, social and economic resilience, and the financing of competing priorities while grappling with existing fiscal pressures other topics included the outlook for Australian government, industry and R&D cooperation with EU, UK, and US counterparts through AUKUS, the forthcoming EU-Australia Security and Defence Partnership, and NATO; and the opportunities arising from major new spending programmes including the EU's €800bn ReArm Europe/Readiness Plan.

On Tuesday, the programme began with a working breakfast at **Stoke Lodge**, kindly hosted by Australia's High Commissioner to the UK **HE the Hon Stephen Smith**. Delegates were briefed on the implications of key developments in the UK's political, economic, and business landscape; the UK's approach to navigating the current geopolitical environment, including managing relations with major powers and actively rebuilding strategic cooperation with the EU (and key member states); bilateral political,













diplomatic, and economic cooperation two years since the entry into force of the Australia-UK FTA; and priorities areas for strengthening Australia-UK strategic engagement across trade, investment, R&D, skilled mobility, and defence and security, including via AUKUS. Next, the delegation was welcomed to the headquarters of Octopus Energy by COO Jon Paull for a site visit showcasing the world-leading innovations and exciting models being deployed by the UK clean energy technology group. Discussions highlighted the role of energy technology in advancing the global transition to net-zero; and the lessons from each market's energy transition; and the economic and regulatory reforms necessary to unlock investment and accelerate the delivery of major projects. Later that morning, the delegation transferred to the Palace of Westminster for a series of political engagements. First, we were joined by Adam Jogee MP, Vice-Chair of the UK Parliament's All-Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) for Australia, for a wide-ranging discussion on impacts of the UK's domestic political landscape and rising geopolitical volatility for the rollout of the Labor Government's agenda on trade, industrial, infrastructure, energy, and defence policy, and relationship reset with the EU.

Over lunch, the delegation welcomed David Crowe, Europe Correspondent for The Sydney Morning Herald and The Age, to share key insights from the EABC mission, and to discuss the economic and strategic outlook for the UK and Europe more broadly, including the implications for bilateral relations with Australia. Next, the delegation welcomed the Labour and Conservative Co-Chairs of the UK Parliament's APPG for Australia, Lord John Spellar (UK Trade Envoy to Australia) and Andrew Rosindell MP. Our discussion focussed on strengthening bilateral ties in economic, R&D, defence and security - core to both nation's long-term prosperity and stability - including interoperability of regulations and standards and mutual recognition of qualifications to ease flows of trade, investment, innovations and expertise, and AUKUS pillars I and II. Later that afternoon, the delegation visited the London office of EABC Major Partner BHP, where we were hosted by current Group Treasurer Stephen Cox, incoming Treasurer Tristan Lovegrove, and colleagues, for a discussion on the company's international strategy, opportunities and challenges they face in Europe, and the outlook for the global energy and critical minerals landscape. To cap off a busy first day in London, the delegation was delighted to co-host a boardroom dinner with CT Group Co-Founder and Executive Chair Sir Lynton Crosby AO. The delegation was also joined by CT Group Managing Director for the UK, James Baxendale OBE, Associate Director, Alan Eager, and Managing Director, for the US, Larry Grossman for presentations and discussions on the the emerging trends shaping the geopolitical landscape and domestic politics across Australia, Europe, and the US; the outlook for global security, rules and norms, economic resilience, and social cohesion; and the implications for policymakers and business leaders. On Wednesday morning, the programme continued with meeting with Sir Clive Cowdery, Founder & CEO of Resolution Life and Chair of the Resolution Foundation. Participants discussed the political and economic outlook in the UK, Australia, and other advanced economies, and the opportunities and critical levers to foster sustainable socioeconomic prosperity as we grapple with major economic and geostrategic shifts. Next, the delegation was pleased to meet with Lord Dominic Johnson, co-Chair of the Conservative Party, for a timely conversation on the trends in recent national elections in the UK and Australia, the need for political parties to modernise and reflect the electorate, and the importance of maintaining social cohesion, constructive democracy, and strong institutions in the face of rising populism, disinformation, and foreign interference.

That afternoon, the EABC jointly convened a networking lunch and UK-Australia Financial Services Roundtable with TheCityUK, the City of London Corporation, and kindly hosted by James Palmer OBE, on behalf of EABC Major Partner Herbert Smith Freehills Kramer. The session brought together an excellent group of senior leaders from across the UK-based financial and related professional services industry for a discussion on the opportunities and challenges facing the sectors in Australia and the UK and the opportunities to facilitate deeper sectoral cooperation, two-way flows of institutional capital, trade, and business investment. We concluded our programme in London with a rich discussion with the esteemed Rt Hon Sir Malcolm Rifkind KCMG KC, former UK Foreign and Defence Secretary and Distinguished Fellow of the Royal United Services Institute (RUSI), the world's oldest and the UK's leading defence and security think tank. We explored the evolving geopolitical, defence and security developments across the Euro-Atlantic, Middle-East, and Indo-Pacific regions; the outlook for current conflicts in Ukraine and Gaza, and escalating great power competition; and the critical importance of strengthening the Australia-UK partnership to navigate an increasingly interconnected, volatile, and polarised global security environment.
